If that's not possible, consider putting some kind of barrier up to keep pets away when you can't be watching," says Gina Spadafori of The Pet Connection, as published on www.veterinarypartner.com. Pets are also in danger of being poisoned if they ingest toxic sap or puncturing their mouths from sharp pine needles. *Christmas Tree Defender* is a great way to protect your pet from chewing on or breaking glass ornaments and either cutting themselves or ingesting these dangerous shards.
